

PASTOR'S GREETING—Fr. Luke Hoyt, O.P.



""This saying is hard; who can accept it?"

The disciples are shocked by Jesus' announcement that "unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you." They tell him it is a "hard saying" and that many will not be able to accept it. Indeed, the Real Presence of the Eucharist continues to be a hard teaching and it continues to divide Christians. But this day, we are called to be renewed in our devotion to Christ given to us in the Eucharist. This weekend, as we hear the words of Jesus in the offering of the Mass, we get to say with Peter, "Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life."



LED lighting in the perimeter of the main church

We installed new LED lighting in the hanging fixtures of the main church last year. Relighting the droppedceiling perimeter area will complete the job.

= \$11,000

LED lighting in the Social Hall

The new fixtures will be smaller, more luminous, energy efficient, dimmable (a needed feature for events like our Wine Tasting), look better, and last longer.

= \$51,500

Our Lady of Pompeii windows and social hall

The windows in the sacristy and the bathrooms of OLP need to be replaced, and we will refurbish the OLP hall (new lighting, new ceiling, repainting) which is used regularly for Sunday refreshments, meetings, and events like the Seven Fishes Dinner.

= \$44.000

TOTAL COST = \$106,500 FUNDS RAISED = \$63,007.34 (As of August 20, 2024)

FUNDS STILL NEEDED = \$43,492.66

Tuesday, August 27th is the feast of St. Monica and on Wednesday, August 28th we celebrate the feast of her son, St. Augustine. A mother-son duo of saintliness, but it was not an easy road for either of them. St. Monica was a devout Catholic from North Africa. She was married and had three children. She had high hopes for her children, as most parents do, but Augustine had other plans, and abandoned his faith. His life of sin caused her much distress, and she prayed tirelessly for his conversion and return back to the faith.

St. Augustine lived a wild life. At one point in his life, he heard the preaching of a Catholic bishop in Milan named St. Ambrose, and became inspired to change his ways. Augustine begged God to forgive his past sins. He studied and devoted his life to God, and eventually Augustine was ordained and named bishop of Hippo. He is considered one of the great scholars of the Church, and also called a Doctor of the Church.

It's interesting to know that even a family of saints sometimes has tough times, and rocky relationships. Saints Monica and Augustine show us that the path to holiness isn't always straight and that we should never give up on the souls of our loved ones.

St. Monica never stopped praying for Augustine. Pray as a family to nurture your special relationships and help your "saints in training" stay on track!



On Wednesday, August 28th we celebrate the Feest of Ct. A brate the Feast of St. Augustine of Hipinistry po. One of his famous quotes is: "He who sings, prays twice." The holy Bishop knew that sung prayer express-

es the joy of the heart. Our voices are gifts, with which we can make music to the Lord, and singing adds to our praise and worship of God. Sung prayer reminds us of the choirs of heaven, with whom we are called to praise God eternally in heaven.

The Holy Sacrifice of the Mass is made more beautiful by the singing of every Catholic, who is called to active participation through sung prayer, especially in the Mass. The Second Vatican Council taught that, "liturgical worship is given a more noble form when the divine offices are celebrated solemnly in song. with the assistance of sacred ministers and the active participation of the people." When the sacred liturgy is sung, it can become more beautiful!

Christians have sung in sacred liturgy since the Church's earliest days, and the Jewish people have sung praise to God, in the context of holy worship, for thousands of years. The Psalms are the record of the liturgical song-prayers of the Jewish people. When we sing in the context of Holy Mass, we join a tradition of sacred worship that goes back to at least the time of King David himself. "Let us come before him with a song of praise," wrote King David, "joyfully sing out our psalms."

Let us remember and honor St. Augustine and heighten our prayers through singing together with joy at mass to praise and give thanks to God for all He has given us.
