Welcome to Lent.

The Holy Spirit has driven Jesus into the desert, and we are beckoned to follow him. Our Church proposes to us three avenues for entering the desert: fasting, almsgiving, and prayer. If we accept her call and make the journey to the desert, we will find ourselves prepared for the Kingdom of Heaven. By going without bodily things we enjoy, we remind ourselves that we were made for something higher than worldly pleasures. By almsgiving, we strive to be people of charity, for only those with open hands and open hearts can receive the great gift of life with God. By prayer, we discover the heart's deepest desire, which is that union with Him which will reach its consummation in Heaven.

So let's heed the call and join Jesus in the desert. To say it will be worth it is an understatement!






All Students Welcome In Grades 9-12



Rules for Fasting and Abstinence During Lent

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 14 and ends on the evening of Holy Thursday, March 28. During the season of Lent, the Church urges the faithful to reflect a spirit of penance in their daily lives through performing acts of fast and abstinence.

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of **fasting and abstinence**. All Fridays in Lent are days of **abstinence**.

Fasting means only one full meal a day may be taken. Two smaller meals may be eaten to maintain physical strength but together they should not equal another full meal in quantity. Snacking between meals is not permitted.

Abstinence forbids the eating of meat or poultry.

Catholics ages 18-59 are obligated to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. (Those who are not specifically obliged to fast are encouraged to join in the discipline of fasting to the extent that they are able.)

Catholics who have reached the age of 14 and older are obligated to abstain on Ash Wednesday and all Fridays of Lent. (Those who are not specifically obliged to abstain from eating meat are urged to join in the discipline of abstaining to the extent that they are able.)

Relígious Education



This is the First Sunday of Lent. The Lenten season began on Ash Wednesday when we received ashes on our foreheads as a reminder of our call to ask for forgiveness of our sins, and try to become more like Jesus.

We are marked with ashes on Ash Wednesday to show that we are willing

to change. It is a reminder of our first marking, at our baptism, our first sacrament, when water was poured over our heads as a sign that we are free of sin, and part of the church, a child of God. The physical symbols of water and ashes are for our benefit; they are human reminders.

The Church gives us Lent as a time to change, to become a better version of ourselves, we can do this through the three disciplines of Lent – prayer, fasting and almsgiving. God knows what is in our hearts; Lent is an opportunity to turn our hearts toward God.


Lent, the penitential season in the Church, leading to Easter, always fell during the springtime in Europe. The word Lent originates from the Old English word "lencten" which means Spring. Soon "Lent" became synonymous with the forty days of penance.

Spiritual writers have pointed out how this identification is actually beneficial. Just as nature begins its reemergence from a winters sleep during Spring, Lent is generally seen as a time of renewal when a soul is reinvigorated in fervor and cleansed of all

impurities. The goal of every Christian is to leave Lent a stronger and more vital person of faith then when we entered. So Lent can be viewed as a spiritual Spring!

We quiet down the music during this season, and will be changing the mass setting to the **Chant Mass**.

The Marian antiphon will also change for the season of Lent, and we will be using the Ave Regina Caelorum. We will review this prior to the beginning of mass so that we can all gain confidence in our Latin, as it contains the vast heritage and traditions of the church throughout the ages.
