PASTOR'S GREETING—Fr. Luke Hoyt, O.P.



Greetings,

I hope your Lent is off to a good start. Each Lenten Season, I am struck by how my body and soul are ultimately grateful for the opportunity to give something up. Saying no to what we are used to initially brings some suffering, but this can quickly give way to a deeper peace, joy, and hope. Our bodies and souls know deep down that they were made for something higher than the easy contentments of this world. So, while sating every surface-level desire may seem to bring contentment, it actually just ends up "crowding out" the deeper desires that point to what we really want and need. Meanwhile, saying no to some of them reminds us of what we truly desire and opens up a space to remember and seek those deeper things anew – which brings peace, joy, and hope. All of this is summed up nicely in one of our opening prayers at Mass this Lent:

Look upon your family, Lord, that, through the chastening effects of bodily discipline, our minds may be radiant in your presence with the strength of our yearning for you. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever.

On another note, our Lenten Parish Mission begins this week. We are welcoming Fr. James Sullivan, OP to all of our Masses this weekend in advance of the Mission itself, which will be as follows:




All Students Welcome In Grades 9-12



Rules for Fasting and Abstinence During Lent

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 14 and ends on the evening of Holy Thursday, March 28. During the season of Lent, the Church urges the faithful to reflect a spirit of penance in their daily lives through performing acts of fast and abstinence.

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of **fasting and abstinence**. All Fridays in Lent are days of **abstinence**.

Fasting means only one full meal a day may be taken. Two smaller meals may be eaten to maintain physical strength but together they should not equal another full meal in quantity. Snacking between meals is not permitted.

Abstinence forbids the eating of meat or poultry.

Catholics ages 18-59 are obligated to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. (Those who are not specifically obliged to fast are encouraged to join in the discipline of fasting to the extent that they are able.)

Catholics who have reached the age of 14 and older are obligated to abstain on Ash Wednesday and all Fridays of Lent. (Those who are not specifically obliged to abstain from eating meat are urged to join in the discipline of abstaining to the extent that they are able.)



Each year our Eighth-Grade students are asked to perform acts of service as part of their Confirmation preparation. They are asked for four service projects, one for church, one for family, one for community and to perform a Random Act of kindness.

Meghan Nebel, an Eighth-Grade student in Mrs. Cappa's class and Emily Raefski, a student in Mrs. Raefski's and Mrs. Sharp's class volunteered to update the Marian antiphon cards in our church as their church service.

The girls came on Saturday morning, and worked their way through the church, removing the old cards, and inserting the new ones. They also cleaned up extraneous papers left behind in the pews.

We are grateful to them for completing this task in preparation for the First and subsequent Sunday liturgies of the Lenten season.

Another change to the liturgy during the season of Lent is the obvious omission of the Alleluia. Alleluia is a term of great joy, our singing the Alleluia is a way of participating in the angels' worship, and a reminder that the kingdom of heaven is established on earth in the form of the church. In its place we sing an acclamation of praise. This year we are using the Lenten gospel acclamation by Owen Alstott.

"Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ, King of endless glory!"

We omit the Alleluia as a kind of verbal, (and musical) fast, not to depress the mood of the liturgy but to create a sense of anticipation and even greater joy when this familiar word of praise returns when we celebrate Easter and the resurrection of our Lord.

In the Eleventh century a hymn, titled, *Alleluia, Dolce Carmen*, was written as a beautiful farewell, it has been translated under the title, **Alleluia, Song of Gladness**.

"We do not now deserve to sing the Alleluia forever; Guilt forces us to dismiss you, O Alleluia for the time approaches in which we must weep for our sins."

The medieval bishop and writer, William Durandus (1237-1296) explained that "we part from the Alleluia as from a beloved friend, whom we have embraced many times".

When the Alleluia returns on Easter, we invite you to sing it with incredible flourish as an expression of our Easter joy.




