PASTOR'S GREETING—Fr. Luke Hoyt, O.P.



"Do you not know that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit within you, whom you have from God, and that you are not your own? For you have been purchased at a price. Therefore glorify God in your body." (1 Cor. 19-20)

So much of our Catholic view of human life is encapsulated in these lines from St. Paul. Christ has "purchased" each of us at the price of his own blood and each of the baptized has become nothing less than a "temple of the Holy Spirit." Therefore, none of us is "our own" anymore. Each of us is no longer accountable only to ourselves, but to God, whom we therefore strive to "glorify in our body," our spirit, and every part of our daily life. And mysteriously, in so doing, we are not diminished. Rather, we are led into the true freedom of a child of God.

A few notes to share with you:

- Thank you to those of you who braved the bad weather to join us for the volunteer appreciation brunch last week. I am truly so grateful for all that each of you does for our community.
- This Monday there is an interfaith prayer service for MLK Day at St. John's Episcopal at 11am. I am
 grateful to parishioner Jay Sullivan for speaking on behalf of our parish at the event and each of you is
 warmly invited to attend.
- Thank you to those who helped our parish distribute \$12,000 to nearly 50 needy households for Christmas. I'm always grateful when we can find ways to extend the generosity of our parishioners to our broader community. As always, please let me know if you ever want to help me with the task of assessing and addressing needs in the community.
- A bit before Christmas, there was a new "declaration" from the Vatican regarding the question of blessings for same-sex couples. Not surprisingly, there has been a fair amount of back-and-forth in reactions to this. For myself, I found the text practical, pastoral, and balanced. It 1) maintains the Church's teaching that marriage is "an indissoluble union between a man and a woman," 2) articulates the meaning of blessings, and 3) encourages a pastoral response that unites charity and truth. I invite you to read it if you haven't done so already. You can find the text here, or by googling "Fiducia Supplicans."
- Mark your calendars for February 26-28, when we will have a special Parish Mission each night, led by a few guest Friars. I hope you can join us for what will be a powerful opportunity for renewal.

Epiphany Sunday at Holy Innocents & OLP Chapel













The Music Ministry continues to lead the Marian antiphons to honor the Blessed Mother before the final hymn. An antiphon typically consists of one or more verses from the psalms or another part of scripture. You may have noticed the sung Entrance and Communion antiphons that are now part of our liturgies.

The Marian antiphons are a group of hymns in the Gregorian chant repertory of the Catholic Church. They are not true antiphons because they are not associated with a psalm verse, and may also be referred to as anthems or chants.

According to the tradition, before Vatican II, the four Marian antiphons followed a date driven schedule, but today each is assigned a liturgical season.

Alma Redemptoris Mater – Advent/Christmas season.

Ava Regina Caelorum – the season of Lent.

Regina Coeli – Easter season.

Salve Regina – Ordinary Time.

We have redesigned the cards with the antiphons to make your participation easier. The cards can be found in the front inside pocket of the hymnal. We respectfully ask that you return them to this spot after use.

Since we have now returned to Ordinary Time, we invite you to join us in the **Salve Regina**. You can find it on the cards and in our Breaking Bread hymnal as #697.



Religious Education The readings for today, the Second Sunday in Ordinary Time, focus on the theme of discipleship and listening for God's call.

In our First reading we hear the story of Samuel. Samuel was the son of Hannah who had prayed to God for a son, and when he was born she was faithful in taking Samuel to the temple to be raised there. One of the priests in the temple, Eli, taught him that he must always listen to God. Samuel's response to God's call was "Speak Lord, for your servant is listening." - we need to listen for God just like Samuel did.

We can listen to God by reading the bible, coming to church, doing good deeds, and making time to pray to Him every day. In our responsorial psalm, Psalm 40, we hear the appropriate response to God's calling – "Here am I Lord, I come to do your will."

In the gospel reading, we hear that when Jesus walks by John the Baptist, John says "Behold the Lamb of God!" This response prompts Andrew to answer the call and immediately follow Jesus. Through Andrew's answer to the call, he also leads his brother. Simon, who Jesus names Peter, and becomes the rock upon whom Jesus builds His church.

To listen to God's call and to do His will is a continual process as we go through our earthly journey. As the circumstances in our life change, we may be called to serve Him in ways that we can never imagine before. It is very important to listen to Him all the time because it is only after listening that we can find the best way to serve Him. We might need someone to help us listen, someone who has solid faith and rich experience in life, a parent, a godparent, a teacher, a mentor or someone like John the Baptist, who helps his disciples recognize God and listen to His call. We should follow Andrew's example and help those around us listen to God so that they can understand God's plan in their lives and follow accordingly.

Through the examples of Samuel in the first reading and the call of the first apostles in the Gospel, we are reminded of the importance of being open to God's voice and responding to His call in our lives.
