PASTOR'S GREETING—Fr. Luke Hoyt, O.P.



Good day,

A few notes to share with you:

- There has been some talk about physician-assisted suicide in the news lately, as our state considers a bill called "The Medical Aid in Dying Act." I am always struck by how, when we take God out of the equation, suffering begins to appear the greatest of evils, as something to be avoided at all costs, even at the cost of life itself. What is the Catholic perspective on this matter? Simply put, it's not up to us to decide when to end an innocent human life, and that includes our own. When a society begins to act as if such matters are up to us, it is to the detriment of everyone. (Bishop Barron <u>offers a quick summary</u> at his Word on Fire website "It's Not Your Life, It's Not Your Death, It's Not Your Choice" 4 January, 2024). See the <u>New York State Catholic Conference</u> website to contact a legislator about the proposed NY State legislation.
- This Friday is Candlemas, aka the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord. When Mary and Joseph brought the infant Jesus to the Temple to consecrate him to God, a "righteous and devout man named Simeon" took Jesus into his arms and prophesied that he would be a "light to all nations." Each Candlemas, we are invited to remember that Jesus is indeed our light hence the tradition of blessing and lighting candles on this day. Come to Holy Innocents anytime from 8am-8pm to light a candle and say a prayer. Join us for Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament from 1-6pm (his Real Presence is indeed true "light!"). And join us for the special candle-lit Mass at 6pm, when all of the candles that have been lit throughout the day will be filling the sanctuary with their light. Truly, Christ is our true light who will always outlast every darkness.

The Music Ministry is introducing a new song this weekend for our Offertory hymn. It is called **<u>Blessed and</u> <u>Beloved</u>** by Lourdes Montgomery.

Lourdes was born in Havana, Cuba, and moved to the United States at age five. She studied jazz piano at Miami-Dade Community College and music composition and classical piano at the University of Miami.

She serves as Music Director of St. Vincent's Catholic Church in Rogers, Arkansas directing the bilingual, English and Spanish masses. She is a passionate piano teacher who loves sharing her love of music with her students and has provided free lessons to students in need. One student, Gabriela Gomez, is now "paying it forward" by playing piano at St. Vincent's and performing with a local Mariachi group.

Lourdes's extensive experience as a pastoral musician and love of people makes her an excellent leader of workshops for Hispanic and bilingual parish communities. She has done presentations at both the national and international levels.

She lives in Arkansas with her husband Michael Montgomery, a classical double bass teacher, composer and musician whose talent may be heard on her CD collections.

Relígious Education





Today, Sunday, January 28th is the feast day of one of the Catholic Church's most famous saints - St. Thomas Aquinas. Thomas was born in Italy to a large family, he had eight brothers and sisters! He studied at the University of Naples, and decided to

join the Dominican order of priests, the same order the priests who

serve our parish are part of!

During the medieval period, people had a hard time figuring out how religious faith, and the philosophy of Aristotle could exist together. Thomas harmonized them through his writings.

He believed that people could prove that God existed in five ways, including understanding that cause and effect was all under God's control, all movement in the world came from God, and that human intelligence was a gift from God. He also believed that people could learn virtue by abiding human and divine law. This is connected to scholasticism, too, because he believed that following laws was based on reason. He had lots of followers and people who agreed with him, so he was very influential both while he was alive and for centuries after his death.

His most famous book is **Summa Theologica**. Thomas Aquinas is one of the 33 doctors of the church. He is also known for his work with natural law, and had an optimistic view of human nature. He believed that it is in our nature to do good and not evil.

St. Thomas Aquinas is the patron of Universities and students because of his love for study and writing. His feast day was originally on March 7th, the date of his death, but since that day often falls within Lent, it was moved to January in 1969.

St. Thomas is most commonly pictured with an open book or quill, as in the beautiful rendering of him in the stained glass window located in the Tompkins Avenue landing in our church.
