PASTOR'S GREETING—Fr. Luke Hoyt, O.P.

"Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Blessed is the kingdom of our father David that is to come. Hosanna in the highest!"

Jesus comes into our Church this Palm Sunday in the name of the Lord, to bring us the Kingdom of his Father. Although he comes already in triumph, it is in fact just the prelude to the true triumph, which will happen next Sunday, when he rises from the dead. But between these two triumphs, there will be darkness, suffering, and the outpouring of his blood for love of us.

Welcome to Holy Week. I invite you to draw close to the Church this week. Let the liturgies of each day be the center of your life. For we cannot know the joy of Easter without accompanying the Lord on his every step through his Passion.

Here's the lineup:

- Come to Confession on Reconciliation Monday (2-4pm, 6-9pm)
- Join us for Holy Hour on Tuesday evening (7pm)
- Join us for Mass on "Spy Wednesday" (7am + 12:15pm at HI; we are also offering Confessions at Our Lady of Pompeii at 5:30pm this day)
- Enter into the Last Supper on Holy Thursday (8pm)
- Accompany the Lord as he walks to Calvary on Good Friday (Stations of the Cross @ 11:30am, Liturgy of the Lord's Passion @ 3pm)
- Experience the mystery and joy of the Easter Vigil on Saturday night (9pm)
- Finally, join us for Mass in the full-sunlight celebrations of Easter Sunday

Liturgy Notes — March 24, 2024

Worldly glory is fleeting. Christ enters into Jerusalem to the tune of crowds chanting, "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord!" Only five days later, the same crowd cries, "Crucify him! Crucify him!" How their fickleness contrasts with the constancy of Jesus, for he remains faithful, humble, "obedient to death, even death on a cross." Despite beatings, insults, and spitting, Jesus knows full well that he will "not be put to shame." United to him, neither will we. In his Passion, we find forgiveness of our sins and the strength to rise above persecution, injustice, and suffering

Entrance Antiphon





The Religious Education Department wishes all the members of our Parish a very Happy Palm Sunday. We hope that all of you will participate in the beautiful liturgies of this week that commemorate the events surrounding the suffering, Death and Resurrection of Jesus.

The liturgies of Holy week are filled with some of the richest and most ancient symbols of the Catholic faith. The waving of palms today reminds us that we are called to be followers of Jesus, not just distant fans.

The Washing of the Feet on **Holy Thursday** speaks to us of the selfless love that we are called to practice in imitation of Jesus. On this holy day we also remember the gift of the Eucharist that Jesus gave us.

The Veneration of the cross on **Good Friday** reminds us that, as Christians, we believe that Jesus can overcome anything, even death.

The lighting of the Easter fire, and the procession of the paschal candle into a darkened church from which our individual candles are lit, speaks to us of the new life that is ours because of Jesus' triumph over the darkness of sin and death through His resurrection.

Our students will not have classes during Holy week, it is our sincere hope that they and their families will participate in these special days.

CONFESSION

(take this with you ... it's really okay)



BEFORE YOU GO

Examine your conscience, that is, reflect on what sins you've committed. To guide you, just Google "examination of conscience" and you'll find resources to help you. It's even all right to make a list to bring with you if that helps.



INTRODUCTION

When you come before the priest, begin by making the Sign of the Cross (praying the words out loud), and continue by saying, "Bless me, Father, I have sinned. It has been (how long) since my last confession. These are my sins..."



CONFESSION

List the sins you've committed that came to mind during your examination of conscience. Don't be too general ("I haven't been a good person"), but a lot of detail isn't necessary (you don't need to tell the whole story of how a sin came about). If you're not sure if something is a sin, ask the priest. This isn't counseling, so unless you ask, the priest likely won't give you advice. He'll just move on to ...



PENANCE

The priest will suggest something for you to do or pray as a response to God's mercy. You'll have to remember what this is and do it after the confession is over, so pay attention



ACT OF CONTRITION

The priest will then ask you to pray out loud your "Act of Contrition," to demonstrate your sorrow for your sins: "My God, I am sorry for my sins with all my heart. In choosing to do wrong and failing to do good, I have sinned against you whom I should love above all things. I firmly intend, with your help, to do penance, to sin no more, and to avoid whatever leads me to sin. Our Savior Jesus Christ suffered and died for us. In his name, my God, have mercy."



ABSOLUTION

Don't get up to leave after that prayer, because the best part is yet to come: The priest will extend his hands in your direction and he will pray the Prayer of Absolution: "God, the Father of Mercies, through the death and resurrection of his Son, has reconciled the world to himself and sent the Holy Spirit among us for the forgiveness of sins. Through the ministry of the Church, may God grant you pardon and peace. And I absolve you from your sins in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen." You respond: "Amen."



CONCLUSION

The priest will then likely say something like, "God has freed you from your sin. Go in Peace." To which you can respond: "Thanks be to God." Don't forget to do your penance. If it is saying certain prayers, it's best to do it right away in the church before you forget.



Rules for Fasting and Abstinence During Lent

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 14 and ends on the evening of Holy Thursday, March 28. During the season of Lent, the Church urges the faithful to reflect a spirit of penance in their daily lives through performing acts of fast and abstinence.

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of **fasting** and abstinence.

All Fridays in Lent are days of abstinence.


Fasting means only one full meal a day may be taken. Two smaller meals may be eaten to maintain physical strength but together they should not equal another full meal in quantity. Snacking between meals is not permitted.

Abstinence forbids the eating of meat or poultry.

Catholics ages 18-59 are obligated to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. (Those who are not specifically obliged to fast are encouraged to join in the discipline of fasting to the extent that they are able.)

Catholics who have reached the age of 14 and older are obligated to abstain on Ash Wednesday and all Fridays of Lent. (Those who are not specifically obliged to abstain from eating meat are urged to join in the discipline of abstaining to the extent that they are able.)

Pews will be reserved for *Golden Jubilee* couples only. Up to four (4) additional family and friends will be accommodated in pews outside of the reserved section in general seating.


