Rules for Fasting and Abstinence During Lent

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 14 and ends on the evening of Holy Thursday, March 28. During the season of Lent, the Church urges the faithful to reflect a spirit of penance in their daily lives through performing acts of fast and abstinence.

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of **fasting and abstinence**. All Fridays in Lent are days of **abstinence**.

Fasting means only one full meal a day may be taken. Two smaller meals may be eaten to maintain physical strength but together they should not equal another full meal in quantity. Snacking between meals is not permitted.

Abstinence forbids the eating of meat or poultry.

Catholics ages 18-59 are obligated to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. (Those who are not specifically obliged to fast are encouraged to join in the discipline of fasting to the extent that they are able.)

Catholics who have reached the age of 14 and older are obligated to abstain on Ash Wednesday and all Fridays of Lent. (Those who are not specifically obliged to abstain from eating meat are urged to join in the discipline of abstaining to the extent that they are able.)

Relígious Education



As you may have noticed, there are many changes in our church when we enter the season of Lent. For example, there are no flowers on the altar, the priests wear purple vestments, and the curtains behind our altar are purple. The Alleluia is also removed from our acclamations and songs.

The last singing of the Alleluia has led to some unique, beautiful and interesting customs including "burying the Alleluia" dating back to the Middle Ages. Modern faith formation classes may bury an Alleluia banner somewhere on the parish grounds, or place the word in a plastic Easter egg, as part of the Easter morning Easter egg hunt.

Our Religious Education classes have observed this custom, and buried the Alleluia after mass on Ash Wednesday. You can see our Alleluia put away on the table in the Social Hall.

Easter is five weeks away, Sunday, March 31st, and the Alleluia will return after its Lenten rest. We look forward to celebrating the joy of Easter and once again proclaiming Alleluia!

Our Entrance hymn this weekend is <u>I Heard the Voice of Jesus</u>. This hymn was written by Horatius Bonar who was born in 1808 in Edinburgh, Scotland, the son of a ruling elder in the Church of Scotland. He became a pastor of the North Parish in the rural town of Kelso.

In Bonar's day the Scottish church had no substantial library of hymns so Bonar began to write hymns. He focused his writing on simple lyrics to familiar tunes geared

toward the youth in the congregation. His interest in growing the library with hymns that fostered participation was successful, and he began to write adult hymns. His gift and interest in writing verse continued as a habit while he served as pastor, and in the course of his ministry he published a number of hymn compilations.

<u>I Heard the Voice of Jesus Say</u> was one of the hymns he wrote during his tenure at Kelso. This is perhaps his most famous song, having found good reception not only in Scotland but also in the wider English-speaking world.

What makes the hymn so widely appealing may well be its focus on the gospel call of Christ to come to Him, look to Him, drink, and rest. Our world today is so different from Scotland in the 1800s, but the hymn speaks to our hearts and our spiritual needs and is rooted in scripture. The hymn encourages all to find in Him all that He has promised.

So let us hear the voice of Jesus and proclaim that Jesus is the answer to people's deepest needs.
