

PASTOR LETTER

"The cup that I drink, you will drink, and with the baptism with which I am baptized, you will be baptized."

At our Follow Me meeting with teens last Tuesday, we read the Gospel passage for this Sunday. After taking five minutes to reflect upon it, I asked our high schoolers if any sentences stood out to them. The first to respond highlighted the above quote. "That is a tongue-twister!" he said. And it is. It's almost as if Jesus wanted us to trip over it. The disciples certainly did, and so do we - and well we should. Jesus is telling us that we will share in his death, which is the meaning of baptism: to let the old self be buried in the water.

Sometimes we are surprised when God permits sufferings in our lives. But he has been announcing precisely this from the beginning, that there will be sufferings. However, he has also told us that we need not fear any suffering or death. So long as we keep our hands in his, any pain will always bear new life. For he has walked the path through the waters of baptism before us - and he has already come out the other side.

- On the election ballot this November 5th, we will have an opportunity to vote on a NYS referendum called "Proposal 1," or the "Equal Rights Amendment." 

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

The month of October is traditionally celebrated as the month of the rosary. This may be due to the fact that October 7th is the Memorial of Our Lady of the Rosary. You may have noticed the presence of the rosary in all of our Religious Education classrooms to honor the Blessed Mother and acknowledge the Catholic tradition of praying the rosary. The word rosary comes from the Latin and means garland of roses. The rose is one of the flowers used to symbolize the Virgin Mary.

The rosary is divided into five groups of ten beads called decades. Catholics are not the only religion to pray with beads. Men and women of many faiths and cultures including Hindus, Greeks, and Buddhists, have and do use beads to pray. The word bead in English is actually

derived from an Old English word that means prayer. The use of prayer beads allows the person to keep track of the number of prayers being said.

There were originally three sets of mysteries of the rosary and in 2002, almost 600 years after the original mysteries of the rosary were established, Pope John Paul II added a new set of mysteries. The four mysteries are the **Joyful**, the **Sorrowful**, the **Glorious**, and the newly added **Luminous**. Each with a unique quality and leading those that pray to ponder the very specific events in the lives of Jesus and Mary and the lessons they hold for our own lives today. We ask the Blessed Mother to bring our prayers to her divine son.

What is "Proposal 1" on the upcoming Nov. 5th ballot?

Sometimes referred to as the "Equal Rights Amendment," Proposal 1 would, effectively, permanently legalize abortion without restriction up until the moment of birth in New York. Aside from being redundant in a state that already has stripped away all abortion limitations, the amendment would render impossible any change to the law if the hearts and minds of New Yorkers were ever to shift toward protecting the child in the womb.

The amendment's sweeping language and inclusion of "age" as a protected class could also lead to parents' rights being stripped away. Courts could decide that parents have no authority over their minor children on important matters and permit children to make destructive and permanent decisions on their own which they could well live to regret, including but not limited to socalled "gender affirming" treatments and surgeries. The relationship between parents and their children is sacred. Parents must be able to support and guide their children in accord with the natural law, without interference from the government or courts, which would be reaching beyond their competency.
